## **Langhe Rossese Bianco DOC 2020**

*Denomination:* Langhe Rossese Bianco Doc

*Municipality:* Monforte d'Alba

*Grape variety:* Rossese Bianco di Langa 100%

*Vintage:* 2020

*Alcohol by Volume:* 12,5%

*Vineyard Characteristics:*

*Sant'Anna vineyard:* Soil: Lequio Formation.

North-East exposure, altitude about 450 metres above sea level.

Planting year: 2011

*Salicetti vineyard:* Soil: Arenarie di Diano.

North-West exposure, altitude about 450 metres above sea level.

Planting year: 2008

*Training System:* Guyot

*Planting Density:* 5.000

*Yield:* 50 q/ha

*Number of bottles:* about 2100

*Harvest day:* It is a late white variety from Langa, it is often harvested at the beginning of October, the 2020 harvest was on 01/10/2020.

*Agricultural management:* In organic conversion

*Vinification:* The grapes are harvested by hand and taken to be made into wine right away. After destemming and pressing the grapes, the alcoholic fermentation starts in the must in a stainless-steel tank.

In the final phase of fermentation, part of the mass is transferred with its fine lees into French oak barrels, where it then remains for about 12 months, and the other part remains in steel, always with its fine lees, “sur lie”.

Batonnage are periodically done to keep the fine lees in suspension.

At the end of maturation, the two masses are assembled and then bottled.

*Curiosity:* Varieties of the Rossese Bianco grape were widely spread in the past in Liguria and Piedmont. The Piedmontese Rossese Bianco from Alta Langa, which has slowly disappeared, is still present today in small quantities in Monforte d’Alba and in the neighboring Roddino. Due to its long-standing certified presence in the Langhe, this variety of Rossese Bianco has been registered among the authorized vines in Piedmont in the national register of wine grape varieties. Currently there are only four other vineries - in addition to Amalia - that produce it for marketing: four in Monforte d’Alba and one in Roddino.
